

Researching the Lives and Words of Poets

WHAT IS AN AUTHOR STUDY?

An author study is a chance to learn more about a poet and their work. During this project, you will:

- Learn about the poet's life: What happened to them and how it shaped their poetry.
- Explore their themes: What ideas do they write about (e.g., family, nature, or feelings)?
- Look closely at one poem: What does it mean, and how does it make you feel?

Purpose: Understand the connection between a poet's life and their poetry.



WHY STUDY POETS?

• Poetry uses creative words to express ideas and emotions.

 Poets often write about their experiences and the world around them.

- By studying poets, you can:
 - Learn more about important themes and ideas.
 - Understand how words can paint pictures and create feelings.



HOW TO CHOOSE A POET



STEP 1: THINK ABOUT YOUR INTERESTS

- Do you enjoy poems about nature, adventure, or family?
- Do you like poems that rhyme or free verse that tells a story?

STEP 2: RESEARCH POETS

- Explore poets from different backgrounds and styles.
 - Maya Angelou (powerful and inspiring poems)
 - Langston Hughes (poems about dreams and life in America)
 - Emily Dickinson (poems about nature and imagination)
 - Kwame Alexander (modern poems about life and sports)

STEP 3: NARROW YOUR CHOICES

 Choose someone whose poems you like and want to learn more about.

GETTING STARTED WITH RESEARCH

Step 1: Learn About the Poet's Life

- Where did they grow up?
- What events or experiences inspired their poetry?

Step 2: Choose a Poem to Analyze

- Select one of their most famous or favorite poems.
- Ask: What is the poem about, and how does it make you feel?

Step 3: Use Reliable Sources

- Find books, articles, or websites with accurate information.
- Ask your teacher or librarian for help if needed.



THE CRAAP METHOD FOR EVALUATING RESOURCES

CRAAP helps you evaluate the quality of your sources.

Currency: Is the information up-to-date?

• When was it published or last updated?

Relevance: Does it relate to your research?

• Is it detailed and appropriate for your grade level?

Authority: Who is the author or publisher?

• Are they credible or experts on the topic?

Accuracy: Is the information true?

• Are there sources cited? Does it match other reliable information?


Purpose: Why was it written?

• Is it to inform, persuade, or sell something? Look for bias.

Tip: Double-check your sources before using them in your paper.

RESEARCH PAPER BREAKDOWN

- Introduction
 - o Tell us the poet's name and why they're important.
- Biography
 - Write about their life story. Include details like where they lived and what inspired their poetry.
- Poem Analysis
 - o Pick one poem:
 - What is it about?
 - What feelings or ideas does it share?
 - How does the poet use words to create meaning?
- Conclusion
 - O Why is this poet's work important?








TOOLS FOR SUCCESS

Reliable Sources: Use library databases, books, and trusted websites.

Organize Your Notes: Write down key details under categories like "Biography" and "Poetry Themes."




Ask for Help: Ms. Martocello or your local librarian can guide you if you're unsure where to start.
