Assignment Overview:

You will write a five-paragraph essay about a poet of your choice. Your essay must include information about the poet's life, their work, and a short analysis of one poem they wrote. In your analysis, you must find two examples of figurative language (such as similes, metaphors, or personification) and explain what they mean.

Essay Requirements:

- Introduction: Introduce the poet and explain why they are important.
- Body Paragraph 1: Give details about the poet's life (where they were born, major life events, etc.).
- Body Paragraph 2: Describe what kind of poetry they wrote and the topics they focused on.
- Body Paragraph 3: Pick one poem and explain its meaning. Find two examples of figurative language and explain what they mean.
- Conclusion: Summarize the key points about the poet and explain why their work is still read today.

Formatting Guidelines:

- Typed or neatly handwritten
- At least two full pages long
- Use complete sentences and proper punctuation
- Include the title of the poem you are analyzing
- Use at least two sources (one can be the poem itself)

Helpful Tips:

- Choose a poet whose work genuinely interests you!
- Read multiple poems to understand their style before selecting one to analyze.
- Look for literary analysis articles or interviews to support your discussion.
- Don't forget to proofread before submitting!

Before submitting your essay, use this checklist to ensure you have met all the requirements. Check off each box once completed! \checkmark

Essay Content & Structure

- □ Introduction states the poet's name and why they are important.
- □ Body Paragraph 1 includes important details about the poet's life.
- □ Body Paragraph 2 explains what kind of poetry they wrote and common themes.
- □ Body Paragraph 3 includes a short analysis of one poem, with two figurative language examples explained.
- □ Conclusion summarizes why the poet's work is still read today.

Writing Quality

- □ Each paragraph has a topic sentence that introduces the main idea.
- □ Sentences are complete and easy to understand.
- □ I used transition words (such as "first," "next," "finally") to connect my ideas.

Grammar & Mechanics

- □ I checked for capital letters at the beginning of sentences and correct punctuation.
- □ My spelling is correct, and I used a dictionary or spell check if needed.

Neatness & Effort

- ☐ My handwriting or typing is neat and easy to read.
- ☐ I read my essay out loud to make sure it makes sense.
