Character Traits Discussion

Positive Traits:

Brave: Someone who faces danger or challenges without fear.

Kind: Someone who treats others with care and compassion.

Honest: Someone who tells the truth and is trustworthy.

Generous: Someone who shares what they have with others.

Hardworking: Someone who puts effort into completing tasks or achieving goals.

Loyal: Someone who sticks by friends and loved ones no matter what.

Negative Traits:

Cowardly: Someone who avoids danger or responsibility due to fear.

Selfish: Someone who only thinks about their own needs and desires.

Dishonest: Someone who lies or hides the truth.

Greedy: Someone who wants more than their fair share and doesn't like sharing.

Lazy: Someone who avoids work or effort.

Disloyal: Someone who betrays trust or is unreliable.

Example of Positive Traits That Can Turn Negative:

Brave → **Reckless:** Bravery is great, but if someone takes unnecessary risks, their bravery can turn into recklessness.

Kind → **Naive:** A kind person might be too trusting, making them vulnerable to being taken advantage of.

Hardworking → **Overworked:** Working hard is admirable, but doing too much without rest can lead to exhaustion or burnout.

Balancing Traits:

- Characters should have a mix of traits, making them feel more real and relatable.
- Heroes, like all people, have flaws and challenges to overcome.

Parts of a Story

1. Characters:

- Who is in the story?
 - Main character (the person or animal the story is mostly about).
 - Supporting characters (other people, animals, or creatures who help the story move along).

2. Setting:

- Where and when does the story take place?
 - Is it in a school, a forest, a city, or in space?
 - What time is it – daytime, nighttime, or in the past or future?

3. Problem (Conflict):

- What goes wrong or what challenge does the main character face?
 - There is usually something difficult the main character needs to solve or overcome.

4. Plot (Beginning, Middle, End):

- *Beginning:*
 - Introduce the characters and setting.
- *Middle:*
 - The main part of the story where the problem gets bigger.
 - The character might try different ways to solve the problem.
- *End:*
 - The problem gets solved (or sometimes not!).

5. Solution (Resolution):

- How does the problem get fixed or how does the character deal with it?

6. Theme:

- What is the lesson or message of the story?
 - What can the reader learn from the character's experience?
 - Examples of themes: friendship, bravery, kindness, or learning from mistakes.
