## Create a Legend or Myth

#### Project Description

Students will write a 2–3 page legend or myth that answers a question like "Why is the sky blue?" or "Why do the stars shine?". Your story will explain a natural phenomenon or event in a creative and imaginative way. Think of legends and myths we went over in class or you may have read, like stories about the Greek gods, Native American folklore, or other tales that give magical or mythical explanations for things in the world.

#### **Requirements**

- **Topic:** Your story must explain a question such as "Why is the sky blue?" or "Why do fish swim?" in a creative way.
- Length: 2–3 pages (typed, or written very neatly on looseleaf), you may go over.
- Formatting:
  - Double-spaced
  - Times New Roman, size 12 font
  - Heading including Name, Class, Teacher (Ms. Martocello), and due date
- Submission Deadline: This project is due on or before December 8th.
- **Presentation:** The story must be typed and submitted either as a printed copy or emailed to the teacher. If you need an exception to typing, please let Ms. Martocello know.

#### Project Checklist

#### Make sure your story includes:

- 1. An Original Explanation:
  - Pick a question to explain (e.g., why it rains, why the sun rises).
  - Create a unique explanation for this question through characters, events, and magical or mythical reasoning.

#### 2. A Beginning, Middle, and End:

- Beginning: Introduce the characters, setting, and the natural question your story will answer.
- *Middle:* Show the problem, the characters' actions, and how the myth/legend unfolds.
- End: Resolve the story with a clear explanation of the question.

#### 3. Characters:

- Include at least two characters (these can be gods, animals, humans, or mythical creatures).
- The characters should play an important role in the explanation of the question.

#### 4. Imagery and Creativity:

- Use descriptive language to help readers picture the setting and events.
- Be imaginative—legends and myths often include magical or extraordinary events!

#### 5. Moral or Meaning (Optional):

• If you like, end the story with a lesson or deeper meaning. Many myths include a moral.

#### 6. Grammar and Punctuation:

• Revise and edit your story for clear sentences and correct punctuation.
