## AUTHOR STUDY: **DISCOVERING THE LIVES BEHIND THE WORDS**

**Researching the Lives and Words of Poets** 

## WHAT IS AN AUTHOR STUDY?

An author study is a chance to learn more about a poet and their work. During this project, you will:

- Learn about the poet's life: What happened to them and how it shaped their poetry.
- Explore their themes: What ideas do they write about (e.g., family, nature, or feelings)?

• Pick your favorite poem by the poet and share why you love it. Purpose: Understand the connection between a poet's life and their poetry.



## WHY STUDY POETS?

- Poetry uses creative words to express ideas and emotions.
- Poets often write about their experiences and the world around them.

• By studying poets, you can:

- Learn more about important themes and ideas.
- Understand how words can paint pictures and create feelings.

#### HOW TO CHOOSE A POET

#### **STEP 1: THINK ABOUT YOUR INTERESTS**

- Do you enjoy poems about nature, adventure, or family?
- Do you like poems that rhyme or free verse that tells a story?

#### **STEP 2: RESEARCH POETS**

- Explore poets from different backgrounds and styles.
  - Maya Angelou (powerful) and inspiring poems)
  - Langston Hughes (poems) about dreams and life in America)
  - Emily Dickinson (poems) about nature and imagination)
  - Kwame Alexander (modern poems about life and sports)





#### **STEP 3: NARROW YOUR** CHOICES

 Choose someone whose poems you like and want to learn more about.

#### GETTING STARTED WITH RESEARCH

Step 1: Learn About the Poet's Life

- Where did they grow up?
- What do you think inspired them to write poetry?

Step 2: Pick a favorite poem

- Review a few poems by your poet
- Choose your favorite poem and think about why you like it and what it is talking about

Step 3: Use Good sources

- Is the author or website trustworthy?
- Is the information clear and easy to understand?
- Does it give you facts about the poet?



### WHAT YOUR PROJECT WILL LOOK LIKE

Introduction

• Tell us the poet's name and why you chose them.

**Biography** 

- Share a few interesting facts about the poet's life
  - Where did they grow up? and what inspired them?
- Your favorite poem
  - Tell us about your favorite poem from the author and why you chose it.
    - What is the poem about?
    - When was it written?
    - Why do you like it?

#### PRESENT YOUR PROJECT

Choose which way you're presenting the information you've found

- Paper write out what you found in a multi-paragraph essay
- Poster Make a colorful poster with pictures, facts, and the poem
- PowerPoint Create a slideshow with slides about the poet and the poem

Be creative! Talk to Ms. Martocello if you have another idea!

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
# **TOOLS FOR SUCCESS**

Reliable Sources: Use library databases, books, and trusted websites.

Organize Your Notes: Write down key details under categories like "Biography" and "Poetry Themes."

Ask for Help: Ms. Martocello or your local librarian can guide you if you're unsure where to start.





**Pick Your Poet and Find One Source** 

- 1. Choose a poet you'd like to study.
- 2. Find one source about them (a book, article, or credible website).
- 3. Write down the source information (title, author, URL, etc.) and submit via google form.
- 4. Be ready to share your poet choice and source in class next week.
