5-Paragraph Essay

Homework: The First Two Paragraphs | Due Date: 11/2/2025

Goal: The goal of this assignment is to practice building the first two layers of our 5-paragraph essay "hamburger": the Introduction (Top Bun) and Body Paragraph 1 (First Topping).

Your Prompt: Use the essay topic and outline we discussed in class today. You will be writing about a Character (e.g., Cinderella, The Big Bad Wolf, Superman, Dug, etc.) and a trait they have (Kind, humble, strong, determined, smart, et).

Part 1: The Introduction (3-5 Sentences Total)

The Introduction acts as the "map" for your entire essay. It starts broadly and ends specifically.

Drafting Steps:

- 1. **Hook (1-2 sentences):** Start with an engaging sentence that grabs the reader's attention and relates to the general topic (e.g., the importance of character traits, famous fairy tale heroes).
- 2. Context/Background (1 sentence): Identify the character and the story.
- 3. <u>Thesis Statement (1 sentence):</u> This is the most important sentence. It must clearly state your claim (the trait) and list your three main reasons (the topics for your three body paragraphs).

Part 2: Body Paragraph 1 (4-6 Sentences Total)

This paragraph develops and proves your first reason listed in your Thesis Statement.

Drafting Steps:

- 1. <u>Topic Sentence (1 sentence):</u> Start with a transition phrase (e.g., First, To begin, etc.) and state the first main idea/reason from your thesis. This acts as the paragraph's claim.
- 2. **Evidence (1-2 sentences):** Provide a specific detail, quote, or example from the story that proves your Topic Sentence.
- 3. **Explanation/Warrant (2-3 sentences):** Explain how your evidence proves your Topic Sentence. What does this detail show the reader about the character trait?
