Today, we became sentence mechanics! We learned that every complete sentence is like a bicycle that needs two wheels to move: a Noun and a Verb. We practiced identifying these two essential parts of speech, making sure we know what they are and how to use them correctly.

Key Takeaways 🔭

- **Nouns are Everything:** A Noun names a Person, Place, Thing, or Idea. They are the actors and objects in your sentences. Remember the four categories: you can see a teacher (person) or an apple (thing), and you can think about freedom (idea).
- **Verbs Make it Happen:** A Verb is the action or state of being. It tells us what the noun is doing (runs, shouts) or being (is, was, are). A sentence can't be complete without a verb!
- **The Sentence Rule:** Every complete sentence must have at least one Noun and one Verb. This is the foundation of clear, correct grammar in standard English.
